Biographical Note by The HistoryMakers®

The Reverend Marion J. Roddy-Hart was born in Chicago. The daughter of a nurse and a manufacturer and one of seven children, Roddy-Hart attended DuSable High School, graduating in 1950. Later, she attended Chicago State University, where she earned a bachelor's degree in 1970. After earning some post-graduate credits at the University of Illinois, Roddy-Hart earned a master's degree from Lancaster Seminary in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, in 1995.

Roddy-Hart spent many of her early years working in Chicago. She started her career performing administrative work with the City Colleges of Chicago. From there, she joined the City of Chicago Department of Health, also in an administrative role. After earning her M.A. from Lancaster, Roddy-Hart became a student pastor, where she has served since 1998. Since then, she has also become the pastor of the Albright-Bethune United Methodist Church in State College, Pennsylvania. Roddy-Hart has also been active with the NAACP for more than twenty years. She is married to Morris E. Hart.

Detailed Description of the Collection

Series I: Original Interview Footage

Reverend Marion Roddy-Hart was born on September 12, 1937 to James T. Wall and Annie May Wall in Chicago, Illinois. James T. Wall was born around 1880 in Barbados and his father was Josiah T. Walls, who was one of the first African American U.S. Congressman in 1871. James T. Wall was a chemist and businessman who owned Offel Manufacturing and was the president of Burr Oaks Cemetery and the Southside Bank and Trust Company before losing most of his money in Chicago's 1933 World's Fair. Annie May Wall was born in Jackson, Mississippi and worked as a nurse. After James Wall died in the mid-1940s, she remarried to a man named Ben Dean. Roddy-Hart's greatgrandmother, Hattie Phillips, was a teacher at Tougaloo College and her greatgrandfather founded Whitfield Mill Road in Jackson. Roddy-Hart and her five siblings were raised in Bronzeville in Chicago. While in high school, Roddy-Hart suffered from an illness that was miraculously cured. [Neither her relation

to Walls nor her father's jobs can be confirmed].

Reverend Marion Roddy-Hart talks about her education, her career in health education, and her brother. When she was sixteen or seventeen, Roddy-Hart developed a debilitating illness that prevented her from graduating from DuSable High School until 1955. She took classes intermittently at Loop Junior College and Wilson Junior College and worked as a stenographer and health educator for the Chicago Health Department in conjunction with the U.S. Public Health Service. Roddy-Hart became the administrative assistant to Samuel Huffman, president of Malcolm X College in Chicago, Illinois and worked in the nursing department at Olive-Harvey College in Chicago, Illinois. Roddy-Hart's brother, Frederick P. Hall, was the editor and publisher of the Chicago Courier and active in Chicago political life as an aide to Mayor Richard J. Daley before his death in 1973. In 1975, Roddy-Hart began attending HistoryMaker Dr. Jeremiah A. Wright, Jr.'s Trinity United Church of God.

Reverend Marion Roddy-Hart describes her career as a minister. Roddy-Hart joined Trinity United Church of Christ after meeting HistoryMaker Dr. Jeremiah A. Wright, Jr. in 1975 at a funeral. Impressed by the church and Dr. Wright's emphasis on teaching, Roddy-Hart became a deacon and was given the opportunity to preach, where she felt the call to become a minister. On November 27, 1987, Roddy-Hart married Morris E. Hart in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. She earned her M.A. degree from Lancaster Theological Seminary in Lancaster, Pennsylvania in 1995 and attended Penbrook United Church of Christ in Harrisburg, where she was mentored by Robert S. Stoudt. She also was an associate pastor at Bethel A.M.E. Church in Harrisburg and interned at Faith United Church of Christ in New Cumberland, Pennsylvania before becoming a minister at Albright-Bethune United Methodist Church in State College, Pennsylvania in 2001. Roddy-Hart describes her church community and the differences between State College and Chicago, Illinois.
