## Biographical Note by The HistoryMakers®

Organic chemist James Shoffner was born on January 14, 1928 and raised on a rural plantation in New Madrid, Missouri. Shoffner's segregated school was open only five months a year; the rest of the time was reserved for growing cotton. He transferred to a boarding school in Kansas City, Missouri where he was first introduced to chemistry and biology. However, Shoffner still had to help in the cotton fields and school for him did not begin until late November. He attended Lincoln University for a year before joining the United States Army, where he earned tuition benefits through the G.I. Bill. After completing his military service, Shoffner returned to college and received his B.S. degree in chemistry from Lincoln University in 1951.

Following graduation, Shoffner worked at the United States Post Office before returning to school and earning his M.S. degree in organic chemistry from DePaul University. Schoffner worked at a local paint company before being hired as a carbohydrate researcher at Corn Products International. After six years, Shoffner returned to graduate school to pursue his doctoral degree in organic chemistry at the University of Illinois, Chicago. After receiving his Ph.D. degree in 1965, Shoffner joined Universal Oil Products Company (UOP) where he would spend the next thirty-six years working in petroleum chemistry, specifically studying NMR spectroscopy and additives for plastics. Shoffner started a second career with the American Chemical Society (ACS) becoming active in the Division of Petroleum Chemistry. He held a series of positions in ACS' Chicago Section including serving as a board member and co-chair of Project SEED, a program to help disadvantaged students pursue a career in chemistry. He became a councilor of the ACS in 1974. In 1993, Shoffner retired from Universal Oil Products and joined Columbia College in Chicago as a science professor and science education consultant. In 2006, Shoffner organized the American Chemical Society conference honoring the famed chemist, Percy L. Julian. He was also instrumental in the development and served as a consultant for the 2007 PBS NOVA program, Forgotten Genius, about the life of Percy L. Julian.

James Shoffner has been active with the American Chemical Society for over forty years and received his thirty-

year councilor plaque in 2005. Shoffner was awarded the ACS Award for Encouraging Disadvantaged Students into Careers in the Chemical Sciences and the Henry Hill Award. Shoffner lives in Elk Grove, Illinois.

## **Series I: Original Interview Footage**

James Shoffner talks about his family background. His mother, Virginia Thomas, was born in the late nineteenth century in Marvel, Arkansas. She grew up and worked on a farm during her childhood before moving North. His father, Andrew Anderson Shoffner, was also born in the late nineteenth century in Obion, Tennessee. After working in the steel mills of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania for a while, he moved to Tiptonville, Tennessee, where he met his wife. Shoffner was born in 1928 in Tiptonville.

James Shoffner's father, Andrew Anderson Shoffner, was a minister and an avid reader, which he deliberately instilled in his children. Shoffner was born on a cotton plantation in Tiptonville, Tennessee in 1928. His earliest childhood memories are of his picking cotton and being involved in church at Mount Olive Missionary Baptist Church in New Madrid, Missouri. His family moved to New Madrid, Missouri when he was two years old. The city is known for its major seismic activity due to its location to a fault line. Shoffner talks about his childhood and his experience at O'Bannon Elementary School.

James Shoffner grew up in New Madrid, Missouri, where he attended O'Bannon Elementary School. He was a good student and enjoyed all of his teachers and subjects. Shoffner then attended O'Bannon High School up through grade ten and, after receiving a scholarship from his church, completed his last two years at Western Baptist Seminary High School in Kansas City, Missouri. He was introduced to chemistry after taking a semester course that taught chemical formulas; there was no lab course for chemistry. Shoffner graduated from high school in 1945 and went on to attend Lincoln University in Jefferson City, Missouri, where he majored in chemistry.

James Shoffner graduated from Western Baptist Seminary High School in 1945 with very little science preparation. Despite that, he entered Lincoln University with aspirations of becoming a doctor and found a mentor in Dr. Monty Taylor. Shoffner's studies were interrupted in 1946 when he decided to serve in the United States Army. After serving for almost two years, he returned to Lincoln University on a GI Bill and completed his B.S. degree in chemistry in 1951. Shoffner moved to Chicago, Illinois and worked at a Post Office while he took graduate courses at the Illinois Institute of Technology and continued to pursue medical school. However, after receiving a rejection, Shoffner decided to abandon his medical school aspirations and continue his graduate studies in chemistry. Shoffner entered DePaul University in 1953 and earned his M.S. degree in 1955. He then began working at Corn Products Refining Company in

James Shoffner received his M.S. degree in organic chemistry from DePaul University in 1955. Shoffner then worked at Johnsteen Paint and Varnish Company for ten weeks before he joined Corn Products Refining Company in Argo, Illinois. He talks about his work at Corn Products, as well as the uses and health concerns for corn by-products. In 1961, Shoffner left Corn Products and began studying organic chemistry at the University of Illinois Medical Center in Chicago, Illinois. His dissertation research focused on the structure and synthesis of pyridinium compounds. After completing his Ph.D. degree in 1963, Shoffner joined Universal Oil Products Company. Shoffner then talks about meeting Percy Julian.

James Shoffner talks about Percy Julian, who is an African American research chemist who made significant contributions to science and medicine. Julian is credited for being a pioneer in the industrial large-scale chemical synthesis of human hormones and medical drugs, such as cortisone. After completing his doctoral studies at the University of Illinois at Chicago, Shoffner joined Universal Oil Products. Concurrently, Shoffner became involved with the American Chemical Society. He also served as one of the first chairs of Project SEED, a program to help disadvantaged students pursue careers in science. In 1973, Shoffner became a Councilor for the American Chemical Society. He talks about his professional activities and his patents.
